



People and Places - UK Universities Tour

People and Places is a regular and popular monthly inclusion in the Mandurah U3A program. At the February 2014 session, President Jo Kreibich and her husband Alan described their 2013 tour of UK Universities, as arranged by Sage Travel.



Each stop on the journey was for the duration of four days, each spent in student accommodation in one of the Universities which included the Royal Agricultural College in the Cotswolds, Telford, Wolverhampton, Stirling University in Scotland, Durham, York University, and the London School of Economics near Covent Garden when they arrived back in London.

For the more energetic, there were the usual daily excursions, but there was also the opportunity to stop and rest for a while for those who were so inclined. Accommodation was meant to be either on the ground floor, or with lifts provided, but Jo and Alan's bad knees did not thank them for struggling up numerous flights of stairs on several occasions.

Jo showed us over two hundred slides which she had collected on her iPad as they did their lap around the UK. They included a fascinating collection of quaint villages, palaces, cathedrals and places of interest, including Oxford and Cambridge Universities. 

Mandurah U3A - Dr Jim Leavesley, AM

It was a very great pleasure to listen to Dr. Jim Leavesley AM, talking about the 18th century Irish doctor and poet, Oliver Goldsmith today. Jim had a more illustrious medical career than his subject, although they both fetched up in a second career in literature.

After being brought up in genteel poverty in an Irish parsonage, Goldsmith gained admission to Trinity College, Dublin. He had several false starts at careers in the church and the law, then as a last resort was put to the study of medicine, which Jim wryly described as 'The last refuge of the ungrateful lay-about'. Although Goldsmith studied at both Edinburgh and Padua Medical Schools, there is uncertainty whether he graduated from either. Not seeing such academic customs as an impediment, he set himself up as a physician in a seedy area near London Bridge, appropriately near The Clink goal.



Goldsmith was a far more gifted gambler, flute player and witty dilettante than a doctor, and as his indifferent medical practice withered away, he sauntered into writing. This more satisfying activity evolved into his true calling for which he has been described as an Irish genius. A statue of him was erected outside Trinity College, Dublin. His famous works include the novel 'The Vicar of Wakefield' (1766), the play 'She stoops to Conquer' (1773), and the poem 'The Deserted Village' (1770).

When Jim retired from his own distinguished medical career, he rekindled his interest in history and literature. He is the author of at least 11 books and in 2006 received an Honorary Doctorate in Literature from Murdoch University.

From the distance of advanced years, Jim looked back to his early years as a schoolboy in Britain and spoke movingly about Mr Illingworth, the English Headmaster who had inspired him and who had had a great influence on his life.

Jim ended his polished presentation with the reading of an excerpt from his favourite Goldsmith poem. And finished precisely on time, the mark of the experienced ABC presenter that he is.

Today also marked the trial of a different format for People and Places. The second half of the session was taken up by a different presenter on a different topic. The idea of having two separate speakers, each taking less than an hour, with the usual tea break in between, seemed to appeal to members. In the second half, Norma Vaughan gave a dynamic presentation on the Very Reverend John Flynn, the founder of the Royal Flying Doctor Service. It was said that the afternoon passed all too quickly.
